From the Vicar

Some subjects are not easy to talk about or to listen to. I, for example, struggle to watch and listen to the coverage of the earthquake disaster in Turkey and Syria. And it's not just what has happened but the failure of those responsible over the years to ensure the safety of people. And those who gained financially by exploiting that failure. It's very difficult to process.

I know that the conversation we have been having during this month in relation to the Voice and the history of Australia are not easy conversations. Often our reaction to these stories raises up emotions, feelings, embedded opposition from places we cannot articulate or find hard to do so in an appropriate way.

And that is ok. We are all uncomfortable with what we hear in the space and not for the same reasons. It is not a comfortable discussion to have but it is necessary if we and our country are going to move beyond guilt, shame, and fear.

Jesus, as we have noted in the Gospels, rarely stays with the comfortable. He unpacks the accepted wisdom in a way that leaves people perplexed and sometime more than a little angry. We read this as if Jesus is unmoved by what he has to say. I would suggest these ideas were uncomfortable to him, a young Jewish man who had grown up with an 'orthodox' education. He was not just challenging others; he was challenging himself. He too, I would suggest, was uncomfortable.

Yes, the Voice and the Statement From the Heart make us all feel a little uncomfortable. They need to if we are to become the nation and the Church we are meant to be.

We want to make a **special collection** for Shannon and the Bendigo Diocese on **Sunday week (19 February)**, particularly groceries and fruit and vegetables, which we will take to Bendigo at the beginning of the following week to make sure they get there and are distributed in good condition.

Sometimes, as Christians, we are asked to do what seems to be impossible. At least, what is impossible at first glance. Today, Jesus appears to do just that when at the end of our Gospel reading He says – 'be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect'. Fortunately, the other readings for today, give us some context about being perfect as God is perfect and that context the impossible becomes possible. Leviticus urges us to be holy as God is holy by opening space for the poor and the alien. In Corinthians we are urged to build our lives on the foundation that is Christ and making our life work consistent with that foundation. The Gospel goes on to urge us to recognise that none are to be hated for who they are – for God makes his sun rise on the evil and the good. Being perfect doesn't mean every action and thought is fully heavenly and pure. Rather, in being willing to love our neighbours as God loves them, we take on the perfection that is our heavenly Father

- Pray that we will recognise the face of Christ in those who irk us the most.
- Pray that we will incline ourselves to God's commands to give rather than seek personal gain.
- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Church of the Church of Pakistan.

[Leviticus 19: 1 – 2, 9 – 18]

¹ The Lord spoke to Moses, saying: ² Speak to all the congregation of the people of Israel and say to them: You shall be holy, for I the Lord your God am holy. ⁹ When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. ¹⁰ You shall not strip your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God. ¹¹ You shall not steal; you shall not deal falsely; and you shall not lie to one another. ¹² And

you shall not swear falsely by my name, profaning the name of your God: I am the Lord. ¹³ You shall not defraud your neighbour; you shall not steal; and you shall not keep for yourself the wages of a labourer until morning. ¹⁴ You shall not revile the deaf or put a stumbling block before the blind; you shall fear your God: I am the Lord. ¹⁵ You shall not render an unjust judgment; you shall not be partial to the poor or defer to the great: with justice you shall judge your neighbour. ¹⁶ You shall not go around as a slanderer among your people, and you shall not profit by the blood of your neighbour: I am the Lord. ¹⁷ You shall not hate in your heart anyone of your kin; you shall reprove your neighbor, or you will incur guilt yourself. ¹⁸ You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against any of your people, but you shall love your neighbour as yourself: I am the Lord.

A Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians [1 Corinthians 3: 10–17]

¹⁰ According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. ¹¹ For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ. ¹² Now if anyone builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw—¹³ the work of each builder will become visible, for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each has done. ¹⁴ If what has been built on the foundation survives, the builder will receive a reward. ¹⁵ If the work is burned up, the builder will suffer loss; the builder will be saved, but only as through fire. ¹⁶ Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? ¹⁷ If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy that person. [Matthew 5: 38-48]

³⁸ "You have heard that it was said, "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.'
³⁹ But I say to you, Do not resist an evildoer.
