From the Vicar

As an artist I have discovered that I see in a way that is different to others. I regularly see outlines, objects, symbols in my art that are not there for others. No amount of cajoling can get them to see. It is simply not visible, yet it stands out, transfigured in the art for me.

Looking is one thing, seeing is another and there is no guarantee the first leads to the second. Often, we miss important clues, hints, and patterns because, despite looking closely, we cannot see what we are not looking for, and what is not embedded in our way of seeing.

The first half of our life is spent in school, universities and jobs learning to see a certain way. The last half of our life is spent unlearning that way of seeing and beginning again. Parents who become grandparents will attest to that, often wishing that they had seen the world around their children the way they see it around their grandchildren.

In our story today we have three of Jesus's closest friends joining him on the mountain top where they are interrupted by an interaction between Jesus, Moses, and Elijah. It is interesting that Luke, who is not there, is certain of who the two men are. Why? Because Peter, James and John saw them and were able to see who they were. That is interesting. How did they see Moses and Elijah, whom they had not seen them in real life and had no image to compare them with? How did they see what they did not and could not have known for certain? How did they know what they saw?

Covid-19 Regulations at 27 February 2022

- Do not attend Church if you are experiencing flu like symptoms or if you are waiting for the results of a Covid-19 test. Please maintain social distancing at all times (keep 1.5 meters from other parishioners). Windows will be open and you are encouraged to use the hand sanitizer at the entrance.
- All are welcome at Church services (regardless of vaccination status). There is no limit on the number of people attending church services.
- Check in is not mandatory for people attending church services. However you must check into St Oswald's using the QR Code poster if you are eating or drinking (this includes breakfast or morning tea after services).
- Mask wearing is mandatory in the Church including the Choir, other than one person leading at one time.
- Refreshments before or after services are for fully vaccinated people. There is no density limit for food and drink. People serving refreshments or food before or after services must wear masks. Self-service food is discouraged. You may be asked to show your proof of vaccination.

I'd also like to say in advance, thank you for listening and encouraging me. A Reading from the Book of Exodus


[Exodus 24: 29—35]

²⁹ Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. ³⁰ When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. ³¹ But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. ³² Afterwards all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. ³³ When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; ³⁴ but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, ³⁵ the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

A Reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

[2 Corinthians 3: 12—4:2]

3 ¹² Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, ¹³ not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. ¹⁴ But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this

very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. ¹⁵ Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; ¹⁶ but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. ¹⁷ Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. ¹⁸ And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit. **4** ¹ Therefore, since it is by God’s mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. ² We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practise cunning or to falsify God’s word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

The Gospel

[Luke 9: 28—36]

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

²⁸ Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. ²⁹ And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. ³⁰ Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. ³¹ They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. ³² Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. ³³ Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, ‘Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah’—not knowing what he said. ³⁴ While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. ³⁵ Then from the cloud came a voice that said, ‘This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to

him!' ³⁶ When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.
